

Thank you to all who took time out of their busy schedules to be a part of the week-end. Our chapter got a great education, met brothers from around the country, learned about new fraternity initiatives, and won a few awards as well.

During the School of Fraternity Practices, Thursday through Saturday morning, undergraduates received education about how to successfully operate the chapter and how to prepare themselves for life after graduation. Alumni also had some educational breakout sessions about housing campaigns, chapter advisory boards, and chapter housing corporations. Look forward to plenty of new ideas coming back to the chapter in the near future!

International Headquarters also put together an outstanding lineup of keynote speakers. Brigadier General Stan Cherrie talked about his career in the Army and what his definition of teamwork is all about. Theta Chi staff unveiled their new initiative, The Sacred Purpose, and how it is meant to transform the undergraduate experience. Lewis Award Recipient Announced

Theta Chi Fraternity is proud to announce the 2013/2014 recipient of the Lewis Memorial Trophy. This year, an alumnus member was recognized for his commitment to helping others in need:

Dale J. Hetland, Phi/North Dakota State University 1992

Dale Hetland gave a special gift; he made a sacrifice simply from the goodness of his heart and because he felt it was the right thing to do.

When Dale learned that the life of fellow chapter brother, Jon Kragness (Phi/North Dakota State 1992), was being threatened by kidney failure, he decided to be tested to see if he was a match. The tests revealed that he was a suitable donor, and arrangements were immediately made for him to donate a kidney to a brother he had not seen in many years.

Shortly before the transplant surgery, Dale contacted his friend, former National President Douglas Allen, to let him know that he would be in a Minneapolis area hospital for a few days. Dale just wanted Doug to know, but didn't think he would need anything.

Doug Allen shares, "After a great deal of concerned prodding, Dale finally relented and told me the reason he would be in the hospital. His reluctance to share his wonderful offering is demonstrative of his humility and unassuming nature."

The transplant was a success and we are happy to report that Brother Kragness and his family are doing well. Our brother gave of himself to save the life of a brother. His actions not only exemplify our motto of "An Assisting Hand," but also reinforce the concept of "Theta Chi for Life."

Brother Hetland has never sought any recognition for his selfless act. He only consented to be nominated for this honor because Brother Kragness encouraged him to use their story to promote organ donation.

It is Theta Chi Fraternity's deepest honor to name Dale J. Hetland the recipient of the 2013/2014 Sidney Ann Gilpin Lewis Award.

Remembering the Dream Girl of Theta Chi

When Donna Kjonaas, Theta Chi Dream Girl in school year 1967-68, was the solitary fourth grade student in a one-room school north-east of Minot she could not possibly have imagined the path her life would take. That this child, soon to be a shy and demure young woman, would be not only Dream Girl of Theta Chi, but NDSU Homecoming Queen and wear half a dozen other crowns and titles before graduation from college, bemuses her to this day.

There were 17 students in grades 1 through 8 in the country school near Glenburn, ND. Teachers needed to find rooms with local farmers so they could get to the school on those worst of winter days. Asked to recall her fondest memories of those times the answer comes easily—harvest time. Helping her mother prepare mounds of food for the evening meals, catered to the men in the fields where large blankets would be thrown on the stubble, and hot delicious food served to all—life suspended in those moments—an awakening of an appreciation for the fullness available in life.

Following school consolidation, and engaged with a larger school population, Donna began to enjoy learning for its own sake: she and a fellow student who would be her co-valedictorian would push each other fiercely toward new challenges. She sensed, however, that she was a “country kid”; she knew people put her in that slot. When she and her best pal were not invited to the junior prom they took matters into their own hands—they invited two senior boys, the so not-done thing!

In the autumn following graduation Donna and her friend headed to Minneapolis where they would attend the Lutheran Bible Institute, later known as Golden Valley Lutheran College. Closed in 1985, the buildings are now home to the Perpich Center for Arts Education. It was very much the start of a Classics education, where she encountered Greek, Latin, and theology. By the end of the school year she sensed the curriculum was not a good fit.

Returning to the farm during the summer Donna and her parents settled on NDSU as the place to continue her education. After all, she was a child of the land; the land grant university would be a better fit.

When I asked about going Greek, Donna said it was an easy decision for a somewhat shy and introverted person. What was not to like about a ready-made set of sisters...a social circle that came to one without great expenditure of energy taking away from one's studies? She pledged and went active at the Alpha Gamma Delta Sorority—a decision she has never regretted.

Donna's undergraduate degree at NDSU began in the Home Economics Department where she was drawn to the art coursework that was offered, albeit limited—not enough in those days to warrant a degree. She then switched curriculum again graduating with a BS in Speech and Audiology.

I asked Donna what she remembered about becoming Dream Girl. A broad smile broke across her face. “That is a huge mystery to me,” she said. “I wonder to this day if there were any politics involved...and who might have been involved in them?”

I smiled back. “I remember five Dream Girls. And I have no recollection of how any of them were chosen. They were adorable; I loved every one, but I didn't have the courage to ask any for a date. They were all above my pay grade.”

Donna married soon after graduation and her husband's career took them to Chicago. Quick to seize the advantage of location, she started a master's program in Communication Disorders at Northwestern. When they moved to Wisconsin she then finished the MS at the University of Wisconsin, Madison.

Following completion of this degree Donna worked in public schools in WI, TX, CA, and GA, both in service delivery, and ultimately in coordination and administration.

A few years later, living in South Dakota, Donna felt a pull back to student status. She completed a second master's degree in Guidance and Counseling. Engaged in that field for a time she reengaged matters of spirituality first awakened as a child on the farm. She attended United Theological Seminary in the Twin Cities and attained a Master of Divinity degree. She subsequently served twelve years in full-time ministry for the First United Methodist Church in Sioux Falls and surrounds.

As we worked our way toward the end of the interview there were a couple of questions I was saving.

“If you could speak to a room filled with young men/women about to engage Rush Week, what words of advice would you have for them?”

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Donna answered without hesitation, “Live in the moment, and assess whether the context of Greek life will help you to achieve success and the life goals you have set for yourselves.”

“Any thoughts you’d like to share with the guys who remember you from your year as Dream Girl?”

“I remember the Brothers of Phi Chapter as gracious, and hope that I was as well. I felt honored to have been chosen.”


