

Greetings to all from Phi Chapter! I am happy to say that your chapter has been thriving as of late. This summer Phi Chapter was honored with the Howard R. Alter, Jr. Award for Chapter Achievement. This is the highest award that can be given to a chapter of Theta Chi Fraternity. Currently, Phi chapter holds 10, giving us more than any other chapter. At NDSU's annual Greek GALA, Theta Chi also experienced a fair amount of success. We received awards for both Scholarship and Greek Involvement. Individually, our own Andrew Beck received the award for Greek New Man of the Year.

Theta Chi is, bar none, the most involved fraternity on campus. Members currently hold the offices of Inter Fraternity Council (IFC) Vice President, IFC Recruitment, **IFC** Secretary/Treasurer, Greek Programming Council (GPC) Scholarship, Public Relations. In addition, members hold the student government offices of Assistant Commissioner Finance and Assistant GRIA Chairman, These just begin to touch on the number of leadership positions our brothers hold on campus.

Internally, we have also made some distinct improvements to the chapter. We have recently implemented a new committee system that will make our chapter run more efficiently. With over 30 positions in the house, we are

able to more evenly distribute the workload, as well as get more chapter involvement. Phi Chapter has also been piloting a brand new member education program called "The Quest" for International Headquarters. The Quest is a program designed to keep members involved throughout their time as active members and ultimately make us better men.

The active chapter has also continued to be a recruitment powerhouse at NDSU. Currently we are at 77 members, making us the largest fraternity on campus by over 30 members. In the fall we initiated 16 fantastic new members and we are looking to have another awesome semester for recruitment. Right now we have 12 members going through our new member process for Spring recruitment.

The reason that we have had such great success at Theta Chi is our quality of men. Obviously, in such a large chapter, we have a very diverse group of members. While we certainly have our disagreements from time to time, we are always able to get back to the essence of what being in a fraternity is all about: brotherhood. We are a remarkably close knit group of guys. I met all of my best friends through Theta Chi, and I can guarantee that just about every other member in our house would tell you the same.

It's been a great year at North Dakota State University. Our new president, Dean Bresciani has made an immediate impact on our campus. The past year is highlighted by the addition of Dr. Bresciani and large donations to our athletic department. Together, these things made the past year at North Dakota State excellent.

Major aides to these improvements are the multi-million dollar donations to the NDSU athletic department this fall. Earlier this year, NDSU and Sanford Health unveiled a plan to build a new athletic

facility to replace the Bison Sports Arena. The new facility will house multiple sports, centered on a new basketball arena fully enclosed with seating. Sanford Health is the major sponsor, donating \$10 million dollars, and Scheels is the other big supporter, donating \$5 million for naming rights to the basketball arena.

As you can see, it is a very exciting time to be a Bison. Under Dr. Bresciani there is a new sense of community and Bison Pride building, and the future looks bright here at NDSU. As time continues to pass, changes continue to happen. In my time as an active undergraduate in Phi Chapter, there have been a number of notable changes. As I look at the framed composites on the walls, I have noticed our chapter grow from almost 45 men to a consistent size of between 70 and 80 members. I have seen our G.P.A climb from around a 2.7 to just around a 3.0. I have had the fortune to see 2 consecutive Alter Awards won by our chapter as an undergraduate. We have also seen great leaders come and go, and we have all seen our share of hard work and difficult times as well. One thing that has never changed about Theta Chi here at North Dakota State University is our tradition of excellence and our commitment to developing strong men who believe in our fraternity and its ideals.

When I had just joined the chapter in spring semester of 2008, the members of the chapter were not in a great state of affairs. This is why we were one of the few chapters selected to pilot the new membership development program titled The Quest. This program aims to enrich all Theta Chis' college experiences by pushing them to build better relationships with their brothers, the community, and themselves.

Guided by the Quest Chairman and Mentor Group, The Quest is divided into three stages, called Challenges, to help develop members as they progress through college; The Power of One is designed for freshmen, My Fellow Man for sophomores and juniors, and The Helping Hand for seniors. Each Challenge has a list of achievements for undergraduates to complete; these consist of goal setting, self-reflection exercises, volunteer work, and leadership seminars to name a few. Although each stage contains objectives designed to fit certain grades, members are free to complete the achievements at their own pace. It would not be unrealistic for a sophomore to be in the final stage of The Quest or a junior in the first, but before moving to a higher level they must be approved by the Quest Chairman and the Mentor Group.

The Mentor Group is a team of undergraduate Theta Chis appointed and led by the Quest Chairman and assigned to groups of about ten which they are to guide through their respective Quest stages. These brothers serve as mentors for their groups and hold monthly sessions where they discuss both the Quest and life. If executed properly, these meetings will help to strengthen brotherhood in groups and develop leadership skills for the facilitators.

The Power of One is the first Challenge and is vital for setting a foundation that will turn members into leaders. To start this stage, freshmen and sophomores are asked to set goals they wish to accomplish during the Challenge, the year, and for college. Mentor Group members who are assigned to the first stage push these underclassmen to develop goals which are meaningful and challenging; through the course of the semester they are to check their progress and ask them to reflect upon what they have learned from reaching, or falling short of, their goals. Goal setting, however, is not unique to the first challenge. The Power of One's main focus is to have members assess themselves and realize their potential; this will help them understand what kind of leader they can be as well as what is necessary to be successful in college. Upon approval by the Quest Chairman, brothers can graduate from this stage and move onto My Fellow Man.

As the title of the second Challenge suggests, My Fellow Man focuses on the importance of working with others. Achievements for this stage include becoming an officer in Theta Chi, collaborating with other Greek chapters on campus, and

joining other campus organizations. These tasks encourage members to learn how to communicate and lead effectively. If Theta Chis complete this stage, they will not only better themselves through new leadership experiences, but they will also assist in promoting the image of Phi Chapter on campus; this Challenge has the potential of transforming our chapter of eighty, which currently has a handful of incredible campus figureheads, into a chapter of eighty outstanding leaders at NDSU. After the completion and reflection of the achievements of My Fellow Man, actives will move onto the final stage of The Quest.

The Helping Hand is the third Challenge, and it assists members in preparing for life after college and encourages them to give back to the community. To prepare for entering the job market, actives are asked to visit the career center to improve their resume and participate in mock interviews, among other tasks. Members are also pushed to learn about how to be an involved Theta Chi alumnus: to accomplish this, they are given suggestions such as attending chapter advisory board meetings or searching for a Theta Chi near their future location. Although preparing themselves for their future is crucial, investing in the community and the next generation of Theta Chis is equally important. This is why members are required to volunteer their time or plan service projects, as well as discuss the importance of mentoring younger members, in order to graduate from The Quest.

There is no doubt that, if successful.

this program will help further set: Theta Chi apart from the rest of campus as the best leaders and men of NDSU. Phi Chapter is certainly: up to the challenge of piloting The Ouest, and we are on our way to making it an integral part of the fraternity. To be truly successful however, the assistance of our distinguished alumni is required. In order to graduate from The Quest, members must be interviewed by The Mentor Team, which consists of the Quest Chairman, a university representative, and a few alumni members. 

I can't wait to see you all at Pig Banquet – let the countdown to the festivities begin!


