As President of the Phi Chapter of Theta Chi, I'm proud to share that the 2024–2025 academic year has been one of strong growth, accomplishment, and continued brotherhood. Our chapter currently stands at 87 active members, reflecting both our commitment to recruitment and the strong appeal of our values to the men of North Dakota State University.

This past year, we welcomed 27 new initiates into our brotherhood, and we are already on track to exceed that number this fall. Just this past week, we officially pinned 28 new pledges — a promising start to another successful year. Our chapter continues to prioritize not just numbers, but the quality and character of the men we bring into our ranks.

Philanthropy and extending an assisting hand remains a cornerstone of our mission. Over the course of the year, our brothers collectively served more than 2,500 hours in the community and raised over \$18,000 for charitable causes. Spring Academics

Academically, our chapter continues to succeed. Last spring, we achieved a chapter GPA average of 3.27. While I would have loved to see that number above 3.30, that goal remains within reach and it's exactly what we'll be striving for in the upcoming semesters. I'm proud to share that 50 brothers earned a spot on the Dean's List last semester, representing over half of our active chapter. Even more impressively, 14 of those brothers achieved a 4.00 GPA.

To keep that momentum going, we've continued our chapter's academic competition, Scholarball. This game brings friendly competition to scholarship, brothers are drafted into teams that earn points throughout the semester by submitting final grades, completed assignments, and participating in Studious Sundays. As the semester goes on, teams compete in playoffs leading up to the championship, where the winning team earns rewards such as a month of house jobs off, one less risk shift, and a steak dinner at the Scholarship Banquet.

Speaking of the Scholarship Banquet, it's been great to see our Dean's List table grow year after year! Our most recent banquet hosted around 80 guys, including 26 new pledges who joined us after their pinning ceremony for our chance to show them a great Monday night meal. During the banquet, we recognized all 4.00 students with certificates and presented other awards such as Most Studious, Scholarball MVP, and Most Improved GPA.

Since launching Studious Sunday, the study room in A.G. Hill has become a weekly event. Every Sunday, brothers come together to study, work on assign-

ments, and help one another with homework while also enjoying Sunday football and having a great time. Last semester, we even hosted a joint Studious Sunday with Alpha Gamma Delta, which had a great attendance from both chapters.

I'm looking forward to organizing more events with chapters at Studious Sunday this semester. Looking ahead, my goal is to help our chapter continue raising the bar academically. I'm confident we'll hit our GPA goal and which will give us our best shot at another Alter Award. Let's keep pushing each other to exceed both in and out of the classroom, and as the maxim goes, Alma Mater First and Theta Chi for Alma Mater.

The 2025 School year is coming to a close and I am pleased to say that Theta Chi Phi Chapter and North Dakota State University had a phenomenal year of service and fundraising.
